- 1. Resistance to chestnut blight and other diseases.
- 2. Whether any of the plants for propagation died from causes such as lack of hardiness or uncongeniality of stock and scion. Number of each now alive.
- 3. Now soon did the selection begin fruiting and your estimate of its productivity in different years, number of nuts or quantity in pounds or in just general terms?
- 4. Your opinion of the size, quality, and other characteristics of the nuts. Do all of them drop free from the burr?
