

CJIS Facilitates Project Planning for CJ Agencies

Judicial Gives a Thumbs Up to CISS Project Planning Tool

As the kickoff of Search Release 1 approaches, tracking the long list of projects, resources and tasks can be an overwhelming undertaking to already resource-strained agencies. To facilitate a way to plan and execute tasks in an efficient and easily visible process to all concerned parties, the CJIS Technical team has developed a customizable view that will be offered to all criminal justice agencies that consume and publish CISS data.

Using the Project Tracking Tool, stakeholders can quickly monitor their resources, track deliverables project and milestones, and provide visibility to the details of a project as it progresses from begin-




Figure 1. Pie chart of resources.

ning to end. Both agencies and CJIS can use this tool to monitor the tasks and resources as they display in real time. The new tool also allows users to make adjustments where necessary and to download reports for references and for sharing.

The new project tracking tool can be adapted to work with any CISS project and will provide a live feed of information that will be accessible to anyone with the assigned security credentials. Users will include managers who assign tasks, the human resources who will be logging their task updates as well as CJIS project managers.

To test the new online application, the CJIS Technical and Project Management teams worked with Terry Walker and other members of Judicial to develop a Project Planning Tool that will help the agency keep track of their CISS projects and help CJIS to work closely with the agency on these projects. The resulting prototype depicted Judicial's Criminal Motor Vehicle System (CRMVS) Search source, with a timeline, resources, an interactive pie chart (see Figure 1), tasks, milestones, deliverables, risk log and an Excel output capability.

The Judicial Project Planning Tool interface consists of seven tabs:

They will present their first comprehensive Project Health Check report at the CJIS Governing Board Meeting in January, 2015.

Highlights: CJIS Governing Board Meeting

The October CJIS Governing Board Meeting took place on Thursday, October 16, at the Division of Criminal Justice in Rocky Hill. Mike Lawlor introduced Judge Elliot Solomon, the designee for Judge Patrick Carroll III, before getting down to business.

Karen Buffkin of the Office of Policy and Management (OPM) reported that Xerox Contract Amendment discussions continue. Negotiations with OPM were complete on all issues except for SharePoint licensing, which has been determined to

be inadequate for the project requirements.

CJIS is ramping up its staffing, though not all positions are filled. Sean Thakkar introduced Mark Morin and Charlie Polizzi, two new senior project managers for CJIS. Both Mark and Charlie are currently visiting with criminal

justice agencies and planning meetings with individual stakeholders. Their focus is to understand their concerns and to help facilitate a smooth transition from a manual information exchange to the CISS electronic information exchange. CJIS con-

tinues to search for qualified candidates for the position of durational project manager. With the current hiring climate and the high demand for IT project managers, the prospects are limited. OPM may decide to expand the search or increase visibility. Eighteen other open positions within CJIS are under consideration for state hiring by OPM.

Members of the Governing Board addressed concerns about data security. One particular discussion focused on the management of data inquiries once CISS goes live. Mr. Raymond said that his group (DAS/BEST) handles a lot of information from a lot of different agencies, but they don't access or interpret the data and recommended that CISS should operate the same way. It was suggested that a standard letter could be written and the language approved by the Governing Board that would direct Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) inquiries to the agency with the system of record. This letter would be sent within four business days of the receipt of the inquiry. CJIS would also send a notice to the requestor informing them of their action. This suggestion will be addressed by the CJIS Governance Committee.

On other issues, Mike Lawlor brought everyone up to date on the CJIS compliance policy with the FBI, since Commissioner Schriro could not attend. A vote was taken to accept the FBI Document that contains a detailed description of CISS and the technical topology. This document and the Management Control Agreement (MCA) will be sent to the

FBI for their review. Other votes included accepting the recent FBI update to the FBI Security Policy (v. 5.3), the acceptance of the new CT CJIS Security Policy (developed by the CJIS Security Workgroup), and the vote to decide to continue to support the maintenance of the Offender Based Tracking System (OBTS) until CISS is in production. All four of the votes taken were passed with Governing Board approval.

A Legislative Report will be released in November that will summarize the accomplishments, risks, and plans for CJIS projects for the year. Though discussions are ongoing concerning the Xerox Contract Amendment and the FBI Document, CJIS has been, and continues to be, busy gathering requirements, scheduling focus group meetings, securing operational and technical support and planning for Release 1 of CISS.

To address the need for independent evaluation of the CISS project, Sean Thakkar announced the *Continued on Page-5*

- **Milestones** Shows the completed and projected milestones, using color coding and percentage of completion statistics (see Figure 7).
- **Deliverables** Displays a list of tasks, the resources, and status of deliverables in color coded and statistical

formats.

- Tasks Gives a high level view of the tasks assigned to the project. It includes the resources, and status of tasks in color coded and
 - and status of tasks in color coded and statistical formats.
 - Excel Spreadsheet —Provides a Milestones spreadsheet that can be opened in Microsoft Excel. Once in Excel, it enables users to create reports, print, and share information.
 - Issues and Risks Opens a log of issues and risks in Microsoft Excel. A user can read, edit, and upload the revised file.

The Project Tracking Tool will provide a fast, more visible and well-organized solution to participating agencies for project planning. CJIS will create a cus-

tomized, online, SharePoint-based Project Tracking Tool for all agencies that consume and publish CISS data. Each agency will only have access to their customized application. CJIS Hosts New Focus Groups

As the CISS project progresses, CJIS will be scheduling and hosting a number of Focus Group sessions. A Focus Group is a small group (6-10 people or larger if needed) discussion guided by a trained leader. The purpose of holding CJIS Focus Groups is to learn more about opinions on a designated topic(s) and promote collaboration and ideasharing, open communication channels between agencies, CJIS, and the vendor on application requirements and determine business requirements and designs.

CJIS will schedule a Focus Group when people need to share views on a subject, when more detailed discussions are needed on a subject, or when there is a need to share ideas in a free-flowing session.

The people who will be asked to participate in Focus Groups

may include some or all of the following:

- Agencies with common characteristics relating to the discussion topic
- CJIS Business team members
- Project Manager associated with the topic
- Scribe
- Key decision makers (as needed)
- Technical experts (when applicable)
- Xerox (when applicable)

A Focus Group is run by an impartial moderator to keep discussions on track. The agenda concentrates on a few key topic(s). If other related topics materialize from the discus-

Lach police department in the State of Connecticut is requested to purchase a router that would give them access to the States Public Safety Data Network (PSDN) that is connected to the CJIS infrastructure. CJIS is working hand in hand with DAS/BEST and each information technology department within the law enforcement agencies (LEAs) to get connectivity to the CJIS Infrastructure.

The current status of those installations is as follows:

- Fifty-four out of ninety-two routers within the state have been configured
- One location is currently being configured
- Nine locations are in the process of purchasing their routers

- Twelve locations still need to purchase routers
- Thirteen locations are in Phase 2 of the PSDN setup
- Five locations still need follow-up on their status

CJIS will continue to work with DAS/BEST and the LEAs to connect the local networks to CJIS in the coming weeks. CJIS will also work with the remaining LEAs on procuring the routers and planning configurations with each town as they receive the routers. ❖

sions, the moderator can take note and schedule a separate session, ensuring that the discussion stays on the planned topics. A scribe is employed to take notes and, after each Focus Group session, shares the results with the greater criminal justice community.

The first CJIS Focus Group topic will be the Search Interface. Discussions will center on how the Search will work, who will be affected, when the Search will be available, and how the Search interface will change with each release. CISS Project Management Updates

Workflows and Information Exchanges Automated transmittal of information between agencies

Xerox has completed commentary on requirements supporting the Uniform Arrest Report (UAR) workflow. These requirements define the flow of arrest related information and documents through the criminal justice system, as well as the specific needs of each stakeholder.

These requirements will provide the foundation upon which the CJIS team will design and the develop capabilities within CISS to electronically distribute information to the participating

agencies.

In November, focus will be on Misdemeanor Summons requirements, which largely mirror the processes associated with UAR. As such, the commentary activity in this area should be greatly streamlined. In parallel, the analyst team is developing detailed rules regarding access to all information and documents in these workflows, while adhering to the Global Federated Identity and Privilege Management (GFIPM) standards defined

by the U.S. Departments of Justice and Homeland Security. The GFIPM framework will provide a measure of security while providing quick access to the information users need to perform their functions.

As the team works toward the completion of the requirements definition phase for UAR and Misdemeanor workflows system, they are also developing more detailed plans for repeating the requirements definition process for CISS Release 6, which supports the Arraignment and Post Arrest workflows.



Search Releases User search of criminal justice agency data systems

The majority of the more detailed Search work in October has been to refine requirements and to improve technical features. Test scripts written for the first two Search Releases have led to more polished requirements.

On the technical side, the CJIS Technical team completed documentation for Xerox for the OBIS system. It is now awaiting Xerox's review.

Court Operations have agreed to the assignment of Global Federated Identity & Privilege Management (GFIPM) claims to each Protection Order Registry (POR) data element and have provided needed code translation tables. Judicial has provided CJIS with an alternate dataset to use for the Criminal Motor Vehicle System (CRMVS) replication. Having access to its near-real-time "mirror site," CRMVS data will be more current than data from the previous dataset.

During November, CJIS and stakeholders will kick off the Search User Interface Focus Group. The goal is to solicit input from Search users from several agencies to aid in the user interface design.

Additionally, CJIS will work with its source system agencies to make certain that the information replicated in CJIS servers exactly matches the data that agencies have approved using the Data Map.

CJIS Business team members will document the data available for Search that will originate from the Uniform Arrest Report (UAR) and Misdemeanor Summons Information Exchanges. •






CJIS Crossword Puzzle
