\$40 Reward

Escaped from New-Gate Prison on the 10th of July inst. Four Prisoners—One by the name of JOHN LARKIN, about 30 years old, six feet three or four inches high, slim built, light complexion, dark eyes, dark hair, professes to be a Physician.—One by the name of WILLIAM DIXON, about 30 years old 5 feet 6 or 7 inches high, stocky built, light complexion, light eyes, and dark hair, had a large scar on one of his wrists and hand, an Englishman.—One by the name of JOHN ELLIOT, about 28 or 30 years old, 5 feet 4 or 5 inches high, stocky built, light complexion, light eyes and light hair.—One by the name of LEVY KNAP, about 40 years old, 6 feet high, slim built, light complexion, light eyes and dark hair,—They all wore the marks of Irons on their legs. They wore away cloth Caps, tow Shirts and tow Pantaloons, dark coloured Vests all very black and dirty.

The above prisoners were quarrying Stone about half a mile from the Prison, with a guard of three men, whom they attacked and took their arms from them and threatened immediate death if they offered to prevent their going. They carried two guns of the Springfield Manufactory with them.

The above reward will be given for the apprehension of the four or \$10 for each, and all reasonable charges paid.
