Hunters alone annually contribute nearly \$25 billion in retail spending, support more than a half million jobs and provide billions of dollars in local, state and federal taxes. more on equipment and travel than does the typical hunter.

There are several reasons why hunter numbers have dropped. Urbanization of this country is a major culprit. More people live and work in cities than ever before and are less connected to the land and thus less likely to hunt. In addition, as cities and suburbs stretch farther into the countryside, wildlife habitat is lost to development. This decreases the amount of land available to hunt and makes it harder to access. Plus, sometimes it's challenging to learn more about how and where to hunt and target shoot as well as understand what equipment you need and

the regulations that govern hunting.
