


Significant changes in arrests and incarcerations since 2008

- On January 1, 2016 Connecticut had 962 inmates aged 18-21, down from 2,067 on July 1, 2009, a 54% Decrease
- Inmates under the age of 18 has dropped from 332 in 2009 to 82 in 2015, a decrease of 75%. Much of this is due to the "Raise the Age" initiative that took full effect in July, 2012.
- The decline in younger adult inmates tracks the decline in the number of arrests of persons 18-21. Between 2008 and 2014, the last year we have complete data for arrest by age, the drop was 44%.


Arrests by age – 2008 through 2014




- Statewide arrests (adult and juvenile) by age in 2008

- Most 15-year olds arrested in 2008 were born in 1993




 In 2009, arrests among youth under 18 were down significantly





 In 2010, arrests kept declining particularly among 16-, 17- and 18-years olds.






 By 2012, arrests among youth aged 18-, 19- and 20year old were down significantly






• By 2014, the drop in arrests was edging towards older youth.


Change in statewide arrests by age 2008 to 2014

Arrests by age, 15-19 through 65+




We observed that arrests among younger, offender cohorts declined most. Older age cohorts, actually, grew.


.. and then we observed a spread among those aged 35 to 50.

Arrests by age, 15-19 through 65+





Percent change in the number of persons admitted to DOC, 2008 to 2015:


All persons: <u>- 46%</u> (6,546 to 3,514)



- The number of young people, those between the ages of 16 and 21, being arrested in CT, on an annual basis, has been dropping consistently
- To determine the impact of Raise the Age (RTA) in the coming years, the following analysis is based on several assumptions.
 - 2015 estimates of arrests of 18-, 19- and 20 -year olds will assume no drop from 2014. Given the existing trends, this makes our projection <u>very</u> conservative.
 - 2015 estimates for juvenile court referrals (<18) will also reflect 2014 figures.

Raise the Age, Impact Analysis



- Following expansions of RTA, the number of juvenile court referrals increased temporarily.
- Even with the addition of 16 and 17 year olds, juvenile court referrals declined.
 - In this analysis, the 2015 estimates for juvenile court referrals will reflect 2014 figures.
