Monthly Indicators Report

Highlights

- On May 1, 2014, 16,541 prisoners were incarcerated in state prison facilities. An additional 4,047 offenders were under DOC custody in community supervision programs. On May 1st last year, 16,728 offenders were incarcerated in state prisons.
- Carleton J. Giles has been named Acting Chairperson of the Board of Pardons and Paroles. He was first appointed to the Board by Gov. Malloy in September 2013. He formerly served 33 years with the Norwalk Police Department.
- Over the last year, the number of offenders Transitional Placement status increased from 28 to 138 (see charts 2a and table 2). The Transitional Placement program allows the DOC to move appropriate offenders out of their halfway house network, freeing up limited residential-bed space to relieve backlogs in the prisons.
- The number of offenders on Parole in May was 19.1% lower that it was a year ago. The number of offenders on Transitional Supervision (TS) was down 12.9% compared to 2013 (see table 2).
- Total monthly remands from all community supervision programs were down 12.5% from last year. Parole and TS remands were down 30.8% and 26.7% respectively. Special parole remands, in marked contrast, declined by only 3.6% (see table 3).

Prison Population Forecast

For the last few months, the prison population had been tracking in a manner that is consistent with typical seasonal patterns. In the first week of May, about 150 fewer people were incarcerated than had been projected by OPM.

At this time last year, the prison population was rising in an unusual way. During the spring, the number of sentenced offenders generally declines at a moderate pace from its peak in February. Last spring, however, the sentenced population was surging even though new prison admissions were flat. When this happens, the cause is generally directly associated with a drop in the number of offenders leaving prison for community supervision programs.

May are usually a solid predictor of how much the prison population will expand during the summer. With major changes underway at the Board of Pardons and Paroles, it remains unclear how quickly that agency will refocus its efforts on increasing the volume of parole packages that must be prepared before a parole case can be heard and parole granted.

January 1, 2013 through February 1, 2015






Chart 2 - Criminal justice, monthly counts and flows

Transitional Placement (TP) allows certain offenders - at the discretion of the Commissioner of Correction or his designee - to be transferred to an approved community or private residence after satisfactory performance in a residential program. According to the Department, TP is to be utilized for Paroleineliaible offenders or those offenders who would benefit from a period of structured supervision following halfway house placement.

Over the last year, the DOC has significantly increased its use of the TP program in an attempt to mitigate the effects of reduced Parole-grant rates on the prison population. Maintaining a reasonable balance between the number of offenders who are incarcerated and those offenders who are supervised in the community is one the major challenges associated with running the state's prison system in a safe and effective manner.

May 1, 2014 to May 7, 2014




Chart 4 – Prison population, first-of-month




Chart 5 – Monthly statewide Criminal Arrests




Chart 6 - Monthly DOC Admissions

March 2013 through April 2014




Chart 7– Remands from community release

April 2014





Chart 8 – DOC community supervision
