Monthly Indicators Report

Highlights

- Considering the time of year, the prison population has remained remarkably stable over the last few months. On September 1st, 16,577 people were incarcerated in the state. By October 1, the population had only expanded to 16,610. As of the first of November, DOC reported that there were 16,605 offenders in the state's prisons.
- The number of parole hearings appeared to stall this month compared to last. The reason is probably related to training and scheduling issues as newlyappointed board members begin settling into their duties.
- Over the last 7 years, the number of offenders on special parole status has increased by 71% (see chart 2a). Since sentences to special parole appear to run significantly longer than those for general parole, the cumulative effect of such a significant growth on future supervision capacity is not well understood or appreciated. The utilization of special parole and the impact of its increasing use deserves more study.
- Chart 2 attempts to provide readers with a sense of the general volumes of people moving through the system each month. While presenting some useful information on how things are trending, the chart does not capture many system nuances. Offenders shown entering Transitional Placement each month, for example, appear to leave prison. In fact, they are already in halfway houses when they enter the program.

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Prison Population Forecast

Last month this paper reported that August prison admissions were down 7.5% compared to August 2013 and that September prison admissions were down 5.2% compared to 2013 figures. During

October, admission were also down compared to last year, this time by 1.1%. It remains unclear why the anticipated summertime bump in the prison population did not occur this year. The Average Daily Count (ADC) for the first week in November was 338 offenders below what OPM projected in February.

We are still anticipating that the prison population will drop through the remainder of the year. The question is, can we expect a drop of several hundred prisoners, which would be typical, without a

prison population that has been inflated due to the normal flow of warm weather arrests and incarcerations. Between now and February 2015, when OPM's next prison population forecast is due, we will be working on identifying why the prison population did not balloon during the summer of 2014.

Chart 1 – Actual prison population against the OPM forecast January 1, 2013 through February 1, 2015







Chart 2 - Criminal justice, monthly counts and flows

In recent years, OPM has reported on significant declines for some important criminal justice measures. Statewide arrests have been dropping, so too have general parole and probation caseloads. The number of crime reports are also down as are the number of people being admitted to prison. One indicator, however, has bucked this general trend: the number of offenders on special parole status continues to grow. Between January 2008 and November 2014, the number of offenders on special parole status grew by 71%.

Judges and prosecutors appear to be increasingly turning to special parole, instead of probation, as a post-incarceration community supervision option. Ostensibly designed to provide authorities with a simpler, more-straightforward mechanism to remand offenders than the probation violation process, special parole is putting greater demands on DOC's capacity to manage offenders in the community. In July 2013, the number of special parolees surpassed the number of general parolees for the first time ever. Since then, the gap has widened (see chart 8).

November 1, 2014 to November 7, 2014




Chart 4 – Prison population, first-of-month 2013 and 2014




Chart 5 – Statewide criminal arrests 2013 versus 2014




Chart 6 - Monthly DOC Admissions

September 2013 through October 2014




Chart 7– Remands from community release
October 2014





Chart 8 – DOC community supervision
