Highlights

- On May 1, 2015, 16,122 people were incarcerated in Connecticut prisons, 76 fewer than the figure for April 1st. Last year, on May 1st, state prison count was 16,541.
- Total releases to community supervision were up 8.8% compared to last month (see table 3). Although it is too early to credit the Central Re-Entry Unit (CRU) at DOC, this new unit appears to be driving some efficiency through the facility release system. The CRU is heavily reliant on the CaseNotes system, which provides real-time data on the progress of cases as they make their way through the facilities. Using operational data to monitor system performance at DOC is a new and welcome development.
- In 2014, one million fewer prison bed days were used at the DOC than in 2008. One million prison bed-days represents the prison capacity required to incarcerate 2,740 prisoners for one year (see chart 2a).
- Statewide arrests were down in April compared to March by 7%.
 Given this, it was not surprisingly that pre-trial admissions to prison were also down by 10% compared to March.
- Grant rates at the Board of Pardons and Paroles (BOPP) have declined in recent months compared to historic grant rates of 70% to 75% (see table 4). It is not clear whether rates will rebound in the future or whether the impact of structured decision making and SCORES assessments means low grant going forward.

Prison Population Forecast

The prison population is continuing to track along the same path that OPM predicted in February. That said, the months of April and May are generally less volatile in terms of wide swings in the prison population.

Over the next few months, OPM will try to assess the impact of various diversionary programs in reducing the size of the state's pre-trial population. The Judicial Branch's Court Support Services Division is in the forefront of these intitiavies, and although their efforts in pre-trial diversion are well recognized and appreciated at the DOC, no-one has yet quantified how large the impact of these efforts actually are in driving down the state's pre-trial prison population. The inability to

measure this impact adds an area of uncertainty to OPM's efforts to forecast the state's prison population.

Although the warmer months generally signal a rise in the prison population, OPM assumes that continued efficiency on the back end of the system will mitigate any increases in admissions.

Chart 1 – Actual prison population against the OPM forecasts




Chart 2 - Criminal justice, monthly counts and flows





Chart 2 contains monthly, operations data for the month of April 2015 and daily counts reported on May 1, 2015. Figures followed by asterisks (*) indicate the daily count on May 1st. In recent years, the state's prison population has dropped significantly. The most direct measure of this decline can be seen in historical daily-count data published by DOC and OPM. What is less obvious is what these declines mean in terms of system capacity and cost.

The graph on the right in Chart 2a contains data for the prison population on December 31 for the years 2006 through 2014. On the left is a graph of the cumulative prison bed-days for the same years. A prison bed-day represents one prisoner occupying a prison bed for a single day. Thinking in bed-days allows us to better understand total demand on system resources.

Between 2008 and 2014, the number of prison beddays used at the DOC fell from 7.1M to 6.1M, a 15% decrease. Assigning a cost of \$50 per each bed-day, suggests savings to be in the range of \$54M. A million bed-days is equivalent to incarcerating 2,740 offenders for one year.

First week of the month, and ADC




Chart 6 - Monthly DOC Admissions

February 2014 through April 2015




Chart 4 – Prison population, first-of-month 2013, 2014 and 2015




Chart 7- Remands from community release




Chart 5 – Statewide criminal arrests 2014 and 2015





Chart 8 – DOC community supervision
