Executive Summary

Introduction

Adult education is an essential component of Connecticut's lifelong educational system, providing individuals with instruction in citizenship, English as a second language (ESL), basic skills and secondary completion. In the 2014-15 school year, more than 12,000 individuals were enrolled in adult basic education/secondary school completion programs and nearly 12,000 individuals were enrolled in ESL and U.S. citizenship preparation programs. Many of these learners faced substantial challenges to balance their life activities in order to persist and succeed in adult education.

History/Background

The Connecticut Association of Adult and Continuing Education (CAACE) honored three individuals from Connecticut's adult education programs on March 26, 2015, for their perseverance and accomplishments.

Recommendation and Justification

I recommend the State Board of Education acknowledge the following individuals for their efforts and recognize them as excellent examples of lifelong learning for all students in the adult education system.

Rose Buonanducci Vernon Regional Adult Education

Since August 2012 Vernon Regional Adult Based Education was fortunate to have Rose Buonanducci as part of the Credit Diploma Program. Ms. Buonanducci diligently worked through nineteen classes, earning an A average, while working full time. Ms. Buonanducci has a positive outlook on life and her enthusiasm for learning is contagious. She not only cares about her academic success, but has, over the years, befriended and supported other students. Furthermore, Ms. Buonanducci's own attendance is outstanding. She pushed herself academically, always striving for a better grade and to improve the quality of her work. Her self-advocacy is outstanding. Ms. Buonanducci's goal is always to

produce work that is the best of her ability. Ms. Buonanducci has worked with Maxim Health Care Services as a Certified Nurse Assistant since 1997. Her gentle demeanor and patience are assets in her work there.

Anh Frederick Bristol Adult Education

Anh Frederick is an exemplary student, reflecting skills that are desired in all Adult Education students. She is committed, hard-working and a quick learner, eager to succeed in all her endeavors, whether it is language learning or high school completion. Bo Wang Norwich Adult Education

In 1997, Ms. Wang enrolled in an ESL class taught at Norwich Adult Education. She made excellent progress and took advantage of increasingly more difficult classes, and successfully worked through a Transitions program that would help prepare her for the High School Credit Diploma Program. Successful in her Transitions program, Ms. Wang earned her first high school credit in June 2008. Concurrently, she began taking citizenship classes and became a United States citizen in 2010. In 2014. Ms. Wang successfully earned additional high school credits and decided to add online courses to her plan of study. She studies hard and works tirelessly at perfecting her English and gaining knowledge. She has rarely missed a day of school and is an honor student.
